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# **A Word from the Academy Director**

#### The Academy Scholar – Helping our students to reflect on performance

In preparation for the new Foundations Curriculum roll out in the Fall of 2016, we have been busy recruiting new teachers as well as planning to re-orient our existing excellent teachers to new roles and responsibilities. I am very excited about the plan to expand the Portfolio component, a highly

popular Clerkship educational activity for both faculty and students, into the first and second years of medical school. Our Academy Scholars (Faculty) and Junior Academy Scholars (Residents) have for the past few years, helped guide our clerkship students in reflection on the CanMEDS roles, what they mean in the everyday experience of



the medical professional, and how one is able to learn from lived experiences to prepare for these important roles in the identity of the physician. Clerkship Portfolio group sessions and individual written reflections have often opened our learners' and faculty's eyes to outstanding examples of communication, collaboration, professionalism, and advocacy. But also we see poor examples of role modelling and the hidden curriculum. In these sessions we teach our students to seek ways of learning from these experiences in order to improve our own performances and positively influence others to the benefit of our patients and society.

New in First Year, in addition to the Academy Scholar's role in helping guide students in discussion about experiences such as listening to the intimate stories from patients in the clinical environment for the first time, managing the strangeness of dissecting a cadaver, and learning to cope with the intensity and stress of the medical student experience, Scholars will have a role in guiding students individually to reflect on their academic performance and progress. Students will present their Learner Chart, which will be an electronic portfolio of their academic progress to date, to their Academy Scholar who will help mentor and coach them. It is well known from the literature, that we are not always terribly accurate in being able to judge our own performance. We need a trusted individual to help us understand our strengths and weaknesses, and focus on where we need put our efforts in order to reach our full potential.

Our faculty members will need to learn about this and other new roles such as CBL tutor. We are estimating that faculty will need about four hours of faculty development on average, and we will be providing this through a variety of means including on-line modules, face to face sessions and just-in-time sessions.

### **Privacy is Paramount!**

#### Tips to safeguarding personal health information

- Never discuss patients in public areas, buses, and elevators.
- Hold onto your sign-out sheets treat them as gold! Shred all consult sheets and sign out sheets that are not going into patient charts.
- CGTA and PRO results are only for use in direct patient care only. They cannot be used for education, research or quality projects.
- Only use your own EPR access numbers, never use someone else's.
- **NEVER** post photos of patients or patient histories online without explicit patient permission.
- NEVER text PHI (Personal Health Information) on a mobile phone.
- Use only hospital email or ONEMAIL for secure communication of PHI.

### Nominate your Third Year Clerk (2015-16) for A Golden Stethoscope Award.
